Video Part 3	Z. Davidson: Presentation and video slides.
14:14	<ul> <li>A. Albert: Riders will not like the skip-stop option – It will not be very popular. You will have to wonder if the car you are in will let you off at the right stop.</li> <li>Z. Davidson: With new door technology only certain doors will open and we will have the ability to add more cars for a 10% capacity increase. This is a stop-gap measure until CBTC is in place.</li> </ul>
16:38	<ul><li>Z. Davidson: Ultra-Wideband discussion: Combine this with other technology you could get rid of the signaling system all together.</li><li>A. Albert: Where is the wideband being tested?</li></ul>
17.42	Z. Davidson: We have to develop proof of concepts before bringing it into the system.
21:21	<ul><li>C. Greif: If a person who gets on the train on the B position, but wants to get off at the A position, how would someone in a wheelchair do this?</li><li>Z. Davidson: Every signal stop will have maps and marked platforms. They will be color-coded with letters to identify where to board and get off.</li></ul>
23:05	<ul><li>E. Shannon: Is there a timeline for the review? Is it a two year proof of concept?</li><li>Z. Davidson: Not sure of the timeline.</li></ul>

Albert: The ultra-wideband – does that require every subway car to be retrofitted with something to receive those?</li> <li>Can this technology be expanded to the B Division countdown clocks because they are inaccurate?</li> <li>D. Zahorsky: Yes, it could be. Right now it is under prototype phase and being tested. It has been used for buses and people, but not for this application yet.</li> </ul>
26:30	<ul> <li>E. Shannon: Has there been any effort to gather any thoughts internally – to include the people at Transit?</li> <li>Z. Davidson: We have seen a culture shift within Transit to embrace the new technology. The Genius Challenge has helped to bring this out within the agency.</li> </ul>

28:25	<ul> <li>V. Jenkins: There needs to be something more in depth for communications regarding deaf people. There needs to be something more.</li> <li>Z. Davidson: Communications platform will be available onboard with digital screens that will give needed information. Hopefully this will address some of your concerns.</li> </ul>
32:12	C. Greif: I've been hearing rumors about fare hikes? A. Albert: In 2019 is the next scheduled fare hike. Should congestion pricing happen sometime there are a few Board members who would like to see the fare hike delayed or mitigated.

All the new trains will come with strip maps, and it has colored lighting to let you know what side to get out on.</li> </ul>
