Approval of March 27, 2025 Agenda Approval of February 27, 2025 Minutes

Chair/ Board Report: by Andrew Albert

- MTA hired new consultants (AECOM and HNTB) to oversee the Second Avenue subway extension to 125th Street, with three new stations planned.
- Ridership is up 9% compared to last February, and congestion pricing has brought in over \$100 million in two months.
- 43 more stations have been named to become accessible in the next capital plan, with an additional 17 not yet named.
- Bus speeds have improved due to congestion pricing, with some buses potentially eliminating fixed schedules.
- Ongoing construction progress on the Rockaway shuttle and A/C line train upgrades.
- ACE cameras are being installed on multiple bus routes to prevent bus lane and bus blocking.
- Student OMNY cards will be replaced with more durable plastic versions by yearend.
- The MTA is pushing back against federal threats to reduce transit funding and cancel congestion pricing, highlighting that New York carries almost 50% of the nation's transit riders but receives only 17% of federal transit dollars.

Trudy asked why the MTA hired new consultants for the Second Avenue Subway Phase II instead of using MTA C&D. Brian responded by saying two main reasons are it's a temporary workforce for a short-term project. And secondly, these consultants have specialties that the in-house team doesn't have.

Marisol asked if there was a criteria for ACE routes? Cate replied that ACE routes are selected by high priority/high-ticket areas.

- 1. Project Goals:
 - Provide cell service in all tunnels
 - Install Wi-Fi at all above-ground stations
 - Generate revenue for MTA
- 2. Current Status:
 - Cell and Wi-Fi are already installed in underground stations
 - Signed expansion license in December 2022
 - Will install connectivity in 300 tunnel segments
- 3. Expansion Strategy:
 - Coordinating with existing capital projects like CBTC to minimize outages and GOs
 - Working with carriers like Verizon and T-Mobile
 - Focusing first on: Time Square shuttle Crosstown CBTC project G line
 4/5 from Borough Hall to Fulton Street and the 4/5/6 from Yankee Stadium to Grand Central
- 4. Timeline:
 - 10+ years to complete entire system
 - 20 years of operation
 - 25-year option at contract end
- 5. Financial Details:
 - Over \$600 million capital investment
 - Minimum guaranteed revenue
 - Potential for increased revenue over time
